Invitation to Prayer

O give thanks to God, who is good; whose steadfast love endures for ever! For you are my strength and my might, you have become my salvation. (Psalm 118:1, 14)

Gathering Prayer

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

God of my salvation, I release the praise that has been supressed, held down not only by the quiet austerity of Lent but with the uncertainty of these days. Filled with your Spirit of life, I open my heart and my lips to say: Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! Amen

Scripture Reading — John 20:1–18

Read the passage slowly. If you are with others, one person might read aloud.

Open-ended wondering questions can help us get to the heart of what is touching and moving us as we read. You are invited to pause at the spaces indicated in the reading and offer your wonderings, silently or aloud if you are with others and wish to do so. Leave the wonderings "dangling". They are not meant to be discussed nor answered. For example: I wonder why the disciple didn't go into the tomb at first?... I wonder what the disciples "believed"?... I wonder how Mary felt when Jesus called her name?...

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him."

I wonder...

Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

I wonder...

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away."

I wonder...

Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.' "Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

I wonder...

- Consider the wonderings that arose for you. Which one or two resound in you now?
- What is sparked within you as reflect on your wonderings? Can you trace the path back to a memory... a current situation... something that is happening for you at this time?
- What, if anything, might your wonderings be trying to say to you just now?

Going Deeper—Art Engagement



Gwyneth Leech is a visual artist based in New York City. In 1981, Leech went to Scotland with a scholarship to study at Edinburgh College of Art where she remained until 1999 when she returned to the US.

The detail to the left is part of a larger, ten-year mural project for St. Mary's Episcopal Cathedral in Glasgow, Scotland. It sets the resurrection scene and the encounter between Mary and Christ in Kelvingrove Park (Glasgow). The iconic Stewart Memorial Fountain and the Kelvingrove Art Gallery and Museum offer a familiar backdrop, locating the resurrection event in the community's landscape.
