ENCOUNTERING

Ephesians 5:8–14

For once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light—for the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true. Try to find out what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them. For it is shameful even to mention what such people do secretly; but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, for everything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it says, "Sleeper, awake! Rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you."

John 9:1–7

As Jesus walked along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither this man nor his parents sinned; he was born blind so that God's works might be revealed in him. We must work the works of him who sent me while it is day; night is coming when no one can work. As long as I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made mud with the saliva and spread the mud on the man's eyes, saying to him, "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (which means Sent). Then he went and washed and came back able to see.

Invitation to the Table

Friends, this is the table of Christ.

It is made ready for those who are drawn here by God's love—
those who desire to live more fully
in the Spirit of grace and love's fruitfulness.

So, let us remember how it all began:

On the night when Jesus was betrayed,
he sat at supper with his disciples,
and while they were eating,
he took bread, said a blessing,
broke it and shared it among them.

Similarly, Jesus blessed and passed around a cup of wine
from which they all drank:

***A body broken, a life poured out—
in our remembering we are awoken.
In our receiving we are made one with Christ.***

So now, following Jesus example,
we take this bread and wine which the Spirit blesses,
and as Jesus gave thanks before sharing, let us do also:

Great Prayer of Thanksgiving

May the Spirit of Christ be with you.

And also with you!

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to God.

Let us give thanks to God who is Wisdom and Love.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

(moments to bring to mind that for which we are grateful)

In this time and place, O God, you prepare a table,
 offering not just bread or wine, but your very self
 that we may be filled, forgiven, encouraged and sent out again.
 Therefore, with the whole realm of nature;
 with earth, sea and sky, we join our voices with faithful everywhere:

***Holy, holy, holy, God of mercy and love,
 heaven and earth are full of your glory.***

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is the One who comes in the name of our God.

Blessing the Bread and Cup

Crucified and risen Christ, present with us now,
 for all that you have done
 and all that you have promised,
 what have we to offer?

***Our hands are empty,
 our hearts often full of petty things.***

***But is your love's power to change us
 that remains our hope and courage for the living.***

Holy God, pour out your Spirit upon us
 and on these gifts of bread and wine,
